- Possible recommendation 3.1 in relation to SME test should be emphasised more strongly and the Chapter should outline how it would work exactly;
- It was noted that the draft is still in progress, but also that the Chapters feel very disconnected and that this should be addressed prior to sending out the next draft;
- Other data methods and sources might be considered instead.
- In relation to the Housing section Council members noted that some businesses might be moving into the sector and attracting talent from abroad by offering them housing on arrival.
- Several members suggested that they will share their more detailed feedback soon;

Chapter 4 - Building and Retaining a Skilled and Talented Labour Force

- Discussion on apprenticeships (drop out rates) and part-time workers should also be included in the Chapter;
- Reskilling and upskilling were viewed as the central concepts;
- Council members also suggested to consider what type of skills are we
 including in this Chapter and to highlight transferable/basic skills;
- Challenge is life-long learning, need to incentivise demand side;
 - o How this relates to AI and Digital
- Reallocation of skills to the non-traded sector is needed, and encouragement of apprenticeships in place of 3rd level
- There is no significant pressure on CE budget currently
- Recommendations were welcomed by the Council.
 - Recommendation 4.5 work ongoing, there is a impact of increased salary thresholds (Secretariat to consider).

Chapter 5 - Technology and Innovation

- Part of our offering on digital, is that we are the regulatory location for these sectors in Europe, requires huge allocation of resources, legislative time and people across areas, regulatory infrastructure; Al companies will have Al regulatory teams in Europe; very scarce skills and everyone is looking for them;
- Need a gear change, call out that we need to invest in at scale, what are we doing that's going to be bigger?; make sure regulatory bodies can do their work;
- Focus of Chapter is on monitoring, but should be more outward looking; if we are going to hold the pen on regulation, we need to make sure we have right people;
- Adoption level and intention to adopt is not universally high among sectors; wait and see approach not enough – adoption curve is short; make recommendations around that to help drive change

Chapter 6 - Planning and Delivering Sustainable Infrastructure

- Member feedback included:
 - This is a broad area, may be beneficial to focus on specific concerns in this area, e.g. housing has been covered off in recent years.
 - Planning and Development Bill is on target to be complete in Summer, an intervention would be welcome.
 - Further work has been done of late in the area of mapping for ORESS 2.1, which can be captured.
 - More clarity in the Recommendations, i.e. is anything additional requested for Planning and Development Bill, or just that it progresses.
- Follow up points:
 - To establish contact with D/HLGH colleagues on Planning and Development Bill
 - o To establish contact with DECC colleagues on ORESS.

- Al Information Session with Microsoft Ireland was briefly mentioned which was a very informative session. All thanks to our colleague Ciarán Conlon for kindly hosting us last month.
- On the 16th of April, the Chair also participated in a roundtable discussion about productivity in Northern Ireland, hosted by Belfast Chamber of Commerce and attended by Minister Conor Murphy, and Joe Kennedy, President Biden's special envoy to Northern Ireland. Conor Murphy has identified productivity at a key focus for his term which represents a radical change for Northern Ireland policy.
- The Chair also attended a seminar focused on the outputs of the DETE-ESRI Joint Research Programme.
